**HOUSE FILE 2647 – BY THE COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS
JUDICIAL BRANCH (COURTS) BUDGET BILL**

HF 2647 appropriates \$148.2 million from the general fund to the Judicial branch. This is a decrease of \$200,000 compared to FY 08. The bill also transfers \$2.5 million from the Jury and Witness Fee Revolving Fund and \$1.7 million from the Court Technology Fund to the Judicial Retirement Fund.

HOUSE ACTION:

Amendments:

H-8422 by T. Taylor changed the amounts coming from the Jury and Witness Fund and the Court Technology Fund but did not change the overall amount going to Judicial Retirement. H-8422 **PASSED** on a voice vote.

HOUSE PASSAGE:

**HOUSE FILE 2660 – BY THE COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS
JUSTICE SYSTEM BUDGET BILL**

HF 2660 appropriates \$521.5 million from the general fund positions to the Departments of Justice, Corrections, Inspections and Appeals, Public Defense, Public Safety, Iowa Law Enforcement Academy, Board of Parole, and the Civil Rights Commission. This is a decrease of \$750,000 compared to FY 08.

HOUSE ACTION:

Amendments:

H-8262 by Horbach cut the Attorney General’s office budget by \$382,000 and appropriated it to the prisons in Anamosa and Mount Pleasant. H-8262 was **WITHDRAWN**.

H-8381 by Zirkelbach mandated that Anamosa continue the funding for two federal programs as a condition of receiving the appropriation for operating expenditures.

H-8421, to H-8381 by Zirkelbach made a technical change. H-8421 **PASSED** on a voice vote.

H-8381 **PASSED** on a voice vote.

H-8272 by Alons and Baudler contained language from an open container by a minor bill. Voting against this amendment means you did not support making the open container law for minors stronger.

H-8272 was ruled **NOT GERMANE**. Alons **MOVED** to suspend the rules to consider H-8272. The motion **LOST** on a record roll call vote of 45-52 with:

**HOUSE FILE 2679 – Committee on Appropriations
FY 09 EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS
Ranking Member - Chambers**

This bill appropriates \$976 million to the Department for the Blind, the College Student Aid Commission, the Department of Education, IPTV, State and local libraries, Community Colleges and the Regents.

The Democrats' target for Ed Approps was \$60 million above FY08 but \$38 million below Governor Culver's recommendation. But to balance this budget over \$24 million was either moved out of Ed Approp or scoop from existing resources including

- \$21 million is moved OUT of Ed Approps
 - \$14 million for Tuition Replacement is now funded through the RIIF
 - \$7 million for the University of Iowa's psychiatric hospital is moved to the Human Services budget
- \$3 million is one-time money SCOOPED from 4 sources
 - \$300,000 from the Board of Educational Examiners from anticipated carryover
 - \$750,000 from the Empowerment Business Partnership
 - \$100,000 from the ending balance of the previous chiropractor loan program
 - \$1.5 million from local Community Empowerment areas with more than 30 percent carryover

The bill appropriates:

- \$75.0 million for the Student Achievement and Teacher Quality Program in FY09 enacted in 2007
- \$10.0 million for Community Empowerment for Early Care, Health and Education that was enacted in 2006 in HF 2769
- \$5.0 million for Community Empowerment for Family Support and Parent Education that was enacted in 2006 in HF 2769.
- \$9.1 million increase for general aid to community colleges. This represents a 3.7% increase compared to estimated FY 2008.
- \$2.5 million in new funding to supplement faculty salaries at the community colleges.
- \$403,000 increase for the Work Study Program.
- \$1.7 million increase for the Tuition Grant Program to nonprofit institutions.
- \$150,000 increase for the Tuition Grant Program to for-profit institutions.
- \$50,000 increase for the **new** Barber and Cosmetology Arts and Sciences Grant Program.
- \$4 million for STEM – Science, Technology, Engineering and Math initiative housed at the UNI which is gear to recruiting students into these fields and improving teaching

The bill includes the language of four stand-alone Education Committee bills:

House File 2680 – Teacher Compensation Clean-Up

- Raises the minimums for first year Beginning teachers and Career I teachers
- Eliminate Market Factor Pay which was set to increase to \$10 million in FY09. The funding moves to teacher salaries
- Provides \$8.6 million for one day of professional development for model core curriculum.
- Requires districts pay out the Teacher Quality salary money in equal installment starting in October of each year
- Allocates FY09 amounts within the \$250 million appropriation

House File 2533 – 4-year-old preschool clean-up – In House Appropriations Makes technical and operational changes to the 2007 legislation.

Senate File 2329 – Categoricals eligible for allowable growth – On House calendar.

This bill makes four categorical eligible for allowable growth starting in FY11. They are: Class Size/Early Intervention; Teacher Quality - Salary; Phase II and Teacher Quality - Professional Development

As with Allowable Growth, the legislature must decide the growth figure within 30 days of the Governor delivering his budget whether to increase each categorical by a chosen percent. Likewise, the categorical allowable growth is set 18 months ahead of the budget year.

The legislature sets the allowable growth rate for districts in January 2009. The programs are not “rolled” into the formula in a true sense. Each categorical maintains its separate program identity.

House File 2649 – Senior Year Plus

This is Governor Culver’s bill which Creates the **Senior Year Plus Program** to increase access of high school students to college credit and advanced placement coursework.

This includes Advanced Placement Program, Postsecondary Enrollment Options Program, Regional Academies, Career Academies, and internet-based courses.

Supplementary weightings for students participating in the Senior Year Plus Program are included in the School Foundation Formula

H-8508 by Heaton. Eliminates the 30 percent to 20 percent allowed carryover for local community empowerment areas. The bill reduces this carryover in order to scoop \$1.8 million to balance this budget bill. **WITHDRAWN**

H-8519 by Winckler and Foege Eliminate the 30% to 20% reduction to Community Empowerment effective **this** year. Meets the target by taking \$360,000 from the Department of Education’s model core curriculum. **ADOPTED** by voice vote.

H-8495 by Winckler Applies the 30 to 20 percent carryover reduction to specific Empowerment categorical. **OUT OF ORDER**

H-8515 by Winckler Adds the Board of Regents to the community college accreditation committee. Also, adds the University of Northern Iowa to the Community Empowerment board. **ADOPTED** by voice vote.

H-8512 by Rep. Pat Grassley, Upmeyer, Kaufmann, Boal, Forristall, and Baudler. Increases community college general state aid line item by \$6.4 million with the money coming from the Power Funds. This brings the community colleges to the their requested level of \$12.9 million in new money for FY09. **LOST** on a record roll call vote of 48-52.

ECONOMIC GROWTH BUDGET

Ranking Member: Representative Schickel

This budget bill contains the budgets for the Department of Cultural Affairs, Department of Economic Development, Iowa Workforce Development, certain Board of Regents programs, and the Public Employment Relations Board. There is also \$500,000 appropriated for the sustainable community initiative. This program is administered through the DED and encourages environmentally conscious growth and sustainability in all DED's programs.

The total appropriation to this budget is \$48,852,220 and 505.60 FTE's. This is an increase of \$6,015,695 over FY 2008 and an increase of 5.7 FTE's over FY 08.

The bill funds the property tax credits from the Property Tax Credit Fund, appropriates \$88 million for state employee salaries, sets the mental health allowed growth factor for FY 10, reduces the reduction to the AEAs by \$2.75 million, adds several bills that did not make it through the funnel deadline and makes several technical and corrective changes.

The bill also increases the pay for the Governor and Attorney General by 10 percent and the other statewide elected officials by 23 percent. The bill decreases the weighting for home school students from 0.6 percent to 0.3 percent, which is a cut of \$7.3 million compared to FY 08.

SF 2023 transfers property tax collected to the Mental Health Risk Pool. The Duane Arnold Nuclear Power Plan was sold to Florida Power and Light. Under current law, when the owner of an electrical generating plant property does not have any other property in the State and no consumers, the property taxes generated from the plant are deposited in the Property Tax Relief Fund. The funds in the Property Tax Relief Fund are distributed to counties to replace property taxes used for MH/MR/DD services. Current law provides dollar-for-dollar property tax relief.

The bill would transfer this specific property tax collected to the Mental Health Risk Pool. The Mental Health Risk Pool is used by counties that have run out of funds for their mental health programs, meet certain criteria, and would have to cut people off if no other funds were available. The property tax collected would be \$627,000 in FY 2008 and \$1.2 million in FY 2009.

Division II - Department of Administrative Services Operations.

This is Senate File 2423. This Division provides that the Department of Management (DOM), and not the Department of Administrative Services (DAS), is responsible for determining which services provided by DAS shall be funded by an appropriation and which services will be funded by the government entities receiving the service. The bill requires DOM to consult with DAS in making this determination. Also provides that DOM is responsible for determining which services that will be funded by the government entities shall be solely provided by DAS. For services solely provided by DAS, DOM is required to establish a customer council responsible for reviewing DAS's business plan and setting the rates charged to government entities. Repeals Code Section 8A.121, which requires that DAS is responsible for those duties. Additionally, this Division provides a detailed list of reports that DAS is required to prepare or produce under current law.

Division III – Commission on Native American Affairs

This is House File 2391. This Division establishes a Division on Native American Affairs within the Department of Human Rights and creates a Commission on Native American Affairs. The Commission consists of 11 members appointed by the Governor, subject to Senate confirmation.

Division IV – Department of Revenue Administration.

This is House Study Bill 662. This Division removes the authorization of the Department of Inspections and Appeals to suspend a person's sales tax permit for a violation of chapter 99B relating to games of skill or chance and raffles – DIA does not have legal authority to suspend sales tax permits. Allows the Director of the Department of Revenue to extend the period of time

for filing tax returns and to suspend any penalty or interest associated with those returns for taxpayers residing in an area declared as a disaster area by the Governor. This Division also provides that any tax, penalty, or interest due which was voluntarily paid by a taxpayer after the expiration of the statute of limitations for assessment shall not be refunded.

This Division repeals the start-up business tax deferral whereby taxable income for the first three years that an eligible business is in operation can be deferred.

The Senate Amendment also incorporates Senate File 2402 – Department of Revenue Policy bill.

- Specifies that allowances are claimed by employees when determining the amount of Iowa withholding tax, not personal or dependency exemptions or credits.
- Allows a replacement part that is used in any repair or reconstruction necessary to farm machinery is exempt from sales tax
- Allows the department to deny an application for a sales or use tax permit if the applicant had a previous delinquent liability with the department
- Exempts transactions that are exempt from the state sales tax from the hotel and motel tax
- Exempts transactions that are exempt from the state sales tax from the equipment tax
- Requires a claim for property tax exemption to be filed by privately owned libraries and art galleries used for public purposes and not for private profit to receive an exemption.
- Includes in the definition of "supplier" a person that produces or acquires bio-fuel or biodiesel for storage and distribution from a terminal.
- Authorizes the director to regard persons dealing in various fuel products as meeting the definitions contained in chapter 452A if the director determines it is necessary for the efficient administration of the motor fuel chapter
- Clarifies that the director may require by rule that tobacco tax “returns” rather than “reports” be filed by electronic transmission. This is a terminology change only.

Division V – Deputy Sheriff Positions

This is Senate File 2322. This Division establishes three deputy sheriffs positions classified as second deputy sheriffs in counties with a population of more than 150,000 but not more than 200,000.

Division VI – Miscellaneous Provisions

- Adds community colleges in the definition of “community-wide area” under the Local Government Innovations Fund.
- Provides that county boards of supervisors may authorize the reimbursement of expenses related to an educational course, school or seminar which is attended by a county officer, after the county officer is elected, but before the county officer takes office.
- Requires the Secretary of State to place a link on the on their website to the IRS’s website with **completed** 990 and 990EZ forms. (Organizations exempt from income tax under Internal Revenue Code section 501(a), which includes sections 501(c), 501(e), 501(f), 501(k), 501(n), 527, and 4947(a)(1) must generally file Form 990 or Form 990-EZ).

Senate File 2417 is the FY 2009 appropriation from the Healthy Iowans Tobacco Trust. This bill is significantly different than previous versions, as the Medicaid portion of the bill has been moved to the Health and Human Services Appropriations bill (SF 2425). Funding for the other programs in the bill remains. The bill increases funding for after-school programs and drug courts. The bill also starts a \$25,000 project to address services for autistic kids in the Cedar Rapids area.

From a policy standpoint, the bill begins the process of eliminating the Healthy Iowans Tobacco Trust. This is the final appropriations bill from that fund.

FIRST SENATE ACTION:

FY 2009 HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS
Ranking Member – Representative Dave Heaton

Senate File 2425 appropriates \$1.207 billion from the general fund to the Departments of Elder Affairs, Public Health, Human Services, and Veterans Affairs, and the Iowa Veterans Home. This is an increase of \$31.1 million compared to FY 08.

The bill includes a General Fund increase of \$29.3 million for Medicaid and increases the Appropriation from the Senior Living Trust Fund to this program by \$42 million. The bill does include a one percent provider rate increase in FY 2009. The bill the funding necessary to implement the mental health allowed growth factor adopted last year, but no additional money to counties for mental health services. The bill also appropriates \$127.6 million from the Health Care Trust Fund for various programs, mostly for Medicaid.

Senate File 2425 also includes a number of policy initiatives, including the Healthy Kids Act (Senate File 2279). A number of health and human services policy bills that did not make it through the funnel have been incorporated into the bill.

FIRST SENATE ACTION:

The Senate **PASSED** Senate File 2425 on a vote of 34-16 on April 17, 2008 (Senate Journal page 1134).

FIRST HOUSE ACTION:

Amendments:

H-8586, by Foege and others: The amendment makes a significant number of changes to the bill. These include actions to:

- Increase funding for the Department of Elder Affairs by \$400,000. The funds will be used to replace a federal grant for the aging and disability resource center and to expand the number of counties participating in elder abuse prevention initiative;
- Increase the allocation of TANF Block Grant for Field Operations by \$2 million, with \$1.2 million for additional income maintenance workers and \$800,000 for additional social workers;
- Reduce the Medicaid appropriation by \$3.4 million, which is mostly the reduction of funds to expand coverage to children and provide \$250,000 for the implementation of the Family Opportunity Act, which allows families with children with special needs to buy into Medicaid;
- Reduce funding for the HAWK-I program by an additional \$2 million, due to lowering the amount of funds to cover additional kids;
- Place into the bill conditions for hospitals to receive a provider rate increase. If a hospital has received both of the following in the 24 months preceding the start of FY 2009, they will be ineligible to receive the rate increase. The conditions are:

1. Subject to a cease and desist order or other adverse decision by the NLRB, in response to a unfair labor practice charge and that order or decision has not been overturned; and
 2. Has been cited for a violation of the OSHA and the citation has not been overturned;
- Increase the appropriation from the Health Care Trust Fund to the Medicaid program by \$850,000;
 - Transfer \$1 million of FY 2008 funds for Mental Health State Cases to Adoption Subsidy for use in FY 2009; and
 - Provide an additional supplemental appropriation of \$2,500,000 for Medicaid in FY 2008 from the Health Care Transformation Account if the funds are necessary to cover additional costs.

Amendments to H-8586:

H-8603, by Foege and others: The amendment increases Medicaid funding by \$6.5 million and provides a 1 percent rate increase to Medicaid providers.
H-8603 was **ADOPTED** on a voice vote on April 21, 2008 (House Journal page 1518).

H-8607, by Miller: The amendment provides that if Congress increases the federal portion of Medicaid funding, the additional funds are to be used to first eliminate the waiting list for the HCBS waivers and then to fund a reimbursement rate increase to Medicaid providers of up to 3 percent.

- Increase funding for the Department of Elder Affairs by \$400,000. The funds will be used to replace a federal grant for the aging and disability resource center and to expand the number of counties participating in elder abuse prevention initiative
- Increases funding for Addictive Disorders by \$1.5 million to be used for tobacco prevention, cessation, and treatment and lowers the transfer from the Gamblers Treatment Fund to Substance Abuse to the level of previous years (\$1.69 million), but still transfers an additional \$525,000 from the fund to substance abuse;
- Revises language governing gamblers treatment services to align with requirements of substance abuse providers.
- Increase the allocation of TANF Block Grant for Field Operations by \$1 million, with \$800,000 for additional income maintenance workers
- Increases the Medicaid appropriation by \$3.2 million, to fund 1 percent provider rate increase;
- Provides \$250,000 for the implementation of the Family Opportunity Act, which allows families with children with special needs to buy into Medicaid;
- Reduce funding for the HAWK-I program by an additional \$2 million, due to lowering the amount of funds to cover additional kids;
- Provides an additional \$2 million to state child care assistance;
- Inserts language to have DHS study effectiveness and use of substance abuse testing of individuals suspected of child abuse, and provides \$200,000 for the St. Luke's Child Protection Center in Cedar Rapids to operate in the Waterloo/Cedar Falls area;
- Increase FY 2009 funding for the adoption subsidy program by \$1.6 million;
- Increases funding for Clarinda MHI by \$300,000 to have a Alzheimer's mobile consultation and assessment team;
- Increases funding for the Sexual Predator unit at Cherokee by \$228,000;
- Increases the funding for DHS Field Operations by \$1 million;
- Maintains the Senate language providing \$750,000 for Family Planning services and provides \$200,000 for the Positive Alternatives Pregnancy Counseling and Support Services and inserts language governing this. It does not preclude a provider of abortion services from receiving the funds;
- Inserts the necessary language to provide the 1 percent Medicaid provider increase, including anesthesiologists;
- Increases the provider rates for child care providers by 2 percent, on October 1, 2008 for registered and licensed providers;
- Increases the appropriation to Medicaid from the Senior Living Trust Fund by \$44.25 million;
- Requires in FY 2010, for a county to receive mental health allowed growth funds, they must be levying at least 90 percent of their maximum levy;
- Increases the appropriation from the Health Care Trust Fund to the Medicaid program by \$1.25 million;
- Revises House language that allows a court to terminate a guardian or conservatorship if there is an immediate danger to the dependent adult in question;
- Inserts the Healthy Kids Act (Senate File 2279);
- Maintains the Senate language requiring insurance companies to cover PMIC's;
- Maintains the Senate language prohibiting an insurance company from forcing a provider into all its programs in order to participate in HAWK-I; and
- Maintains the Senate language establishing protective and no-contact orders for family pets in domestic disputes.

**SENATE FILE 2428 – BY THE COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS
ENHANCED DEBT COLLECTION**

Senate File 2428 makes dramatic changes to the collection of delinquent debt owed the State and political subdivisions of the State by requiring offsets of gambling winnings, sanctioning of professional licenses, modifying provisions related to county attorney collections, writing off certain delinquent court debt, and modifying provisions relating to the deposit of certain funds in the Jury and Witness Fee Fund.

The bill requires casinos to maintain electronic access to a list of debtors and withhold winnings if the winning gambler owes the state or local government at least \$10,000.

For debt owed the Department of Revenue, the bill requires the department to issue a “certificate of noncompliance” to a licensing authority if a licensee owes the department more than \$1000. (This attempts to collect back taxes owed to the state.)

A licensee is anyone who seeks a license, certification, registration, permit, approval, renewal, or other similar authorization issued to a person by a licensing authority which evidences the admission to, or granting of authority to engage in, a profession, occupation, business, industry, or recreation. It also includes licenses for hunting and fishing, or other recreational activity.

The bill makes changes to four areas of the collection of debt – the Clerk of Court, the Department of Revenue, the County Attorneys and a private collection agency.

The court debt is deemed delinquent if it is not paid within thirty days after the date it is assessed. An amount which was ordered by the court to be paid on a date fixed in the future pursuant to section 909.3 is deemed delinquent if it is not received by the clerk within thirty days after the fixed future date set out in the court order. If an amount was ordered to be paid by installments, and an installment is not received within thirty days after the date it is due, the entire amount of the court debt is deemed delinquent.

In addition, the judicial branch may contract with a private collection designee for the collection of court debt sixty days after the court debt in a case is deemed delinquent if the county attorney is not collecting the court debt in a case. The contract shall provide for a collection fee equal to twenty-five percent of the amount of the court debt in a case deemed delinquent. It requires the Judicial Branch to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a private contractor to collect debt.

Finally, it transfers two-year old debt into the general fund. Under current law, debt that is older than two years is deposited into the Jury and Witness Revolving Fund to pay jury and witness fees. Fiscal Services projects that due to this transfer the fund will be completely drained in FY 2011.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND CAPITOLS APPROPRIATIONS BILL

The infrastructure bill appropriates money from seven funds. Those funds include the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF), Endowment for Iowa’s Health Restricted Capitals Fund (RC2), Restricted Capital Fund (RCF), Technology Reinvestment Fund (TRF), FY09 Restricted Capital Fund (RC3), FY09 Prison Bonding Fund (PBF) and Environment First Fund (EFF).

The “Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund” is composed of excess gambling revenue, gamblers treatment fund excess, license fee tax credit, reserve fund interest, fund interest, riverboat license fee and interest. Moneys in this fund are to be spent on “vertical infrastructure” projects meaning land acquisition and construction, major renovation and repair of buildings, and site development. This year there are a large number of projects that don’t meet the definition of vertical infrastructure.

The “Endowment for Iowa’s Health Restricted Capitols Fund” came about from the restructuring of the Restricted Capitol Fund that occurred at the end of November 2005. The money in this account must be spent by the end of FY11.

The “Restricted Capitol Fund” ends at the end of this year. The revenue came from the first time the tobacco bonds were to be securitized. To meet with our tax exempt status we must appropriate all of the money by the end of this year.

The “Technology Reinvestment Fund” was created two years ago. It receives a \$17.5 million annual standing general fund appropriation. The fund is dedicated to a wide variety of technology projects. This bill continues the fund in future years.

The “FY 2009 Restricted Capitol Fund” was created this year in this bill. The revenue for this fund comes from the issuance of tax-exempt bonds for the non-securitized tobacco settlement dollars. These projects must meet the IRS definition of vertical infrastructure or the state is penalized due to the bond status.

The “FY 2009 Prison Bonding Fund” was created this year in this bill. The money from the fund will be used to fund the Ft. Madison Penitentiary. The bonds will be paid off or a number of years using resources established by code.

The “Environment First Fund” receives its revenue from the RIIF. The budget is usually included the agriculture related budget items. This bill increases the standing appropriation to the EFF.

This bill appropriates \$484,031,234 in FY09, \$100,591,662 in FY10, \$25,500,000 in FY11, and \$20,779,000 in FY12 from the following sources:

- Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF) - \$144,671,412 in FY09, \$100,105,412 in FY10, \$25,500,000 in FY11, \$29,779,000 in FY12.
- Endowment for Iowa’s Health Restricted Capital Fund (RC2) – \$5,100,000 in FY09
- Restricted Capitol Fund (RCF) - \$3,286,457
- Technology Reinvestment Fund (TRF) - \$17,501,167 in FY09 and \$486, 250 in FY10
- FY 2009 Restricted Capital Fund (RC3) - \$182,794,698 in FY09
- Prison Bonding Fund (PBF) - \$130,677,500 in FY09
- Environment First Fund (EFF) - \$2,000,000 in FY09

This bill also makes other miscellaneous appropriations changes and significant code changes.
