This bill addresses deer depredation issues in several ways. It creates a farmer advisory committee made up of stakeholders from various industry and conservation groups effected by deer. It also establishes both depredation licenses and permits for landowners. It also creates a Deer Study Committee made up of various stakeholders and will address issues surrounding Iowa’s deer population and its size and impact.

The amendment would direct 3/8 of a cent into the trust after the next sale tax increase which would generate approximately \$150 million annually for Natural Resources Funding. DNR DEPARTMENTAL BILL

Ranking Member: Representative Rayhons

This is the comprehensive DNR departmental bill. The bill makes a number of changes including reciprocity of hunter’s training, licenses for veterans, penalties for ATV usage, driving over ice, and membership on the County Resource Committee. It was amended to also require floatation devices for all minors under 13 on a vessel on a state waterway.

HOUSE ACTION:

Consideration of House File 2612:

Amendments:

H-8107 by Baudler: Reinserts voter registration as a means to show state residency for the purposes of obtaining a resident hunter’s license. **H-8107** was **WITHDRAWN**.

H-8118 by Bell: Creates a special preserve hunting license for nonresident youth. This allow you under 16 to obtain a license to hunt only in a state preserve and when accompanied by a licensed adult. The youth does not have to complete hunter’s safety training by must pay the license fee and the wildlife habitat fee. **H-8118** was **ADOPTED** on a voice vote.

H-8213 by Baudler: Eliminates Division 2 of the bill the makes changes to residency requirements for hunting. It makes one change to current law, by striking the use of voter registration as a mean of demonstrating state residency. **H-8213** was **OUT OF ORDER**.

H-8203 by Grassley: Limits the ability of the Department of Natural Resources to condemn property for recreational purposes and use. The land can be obtained through willing sale but eminent domain cannot be used to obtain land by the DNR for these purposes. **H-8203** was ruled **NOT GERMANE**. Representative Grassley **MOVED** to suspend the rules to consider amendment H-8203. The motion to suspend the rules **FAILED** on a record roll call vote of 45-54 with:

The Senate **PASSED** House File 2612 as amended on April 16, 2008 by a vote of 50-0.

HOUSE ACTION ON BILL AS AMENDED:

Amendments:

H-8552 by the Senate: Adds 3 members to the County Resource Enhancement Committee. It includes a representative of a historic preservation commission, a private historical organization, and a representative of a historical museum appointed by the board of supervisors. Also adds language requiring that any person under 13 on a vessel on state water be wearing a life vest. It doesn't apply when the minor is in an enclosed cabin or below deck. It also doesn't apply when the minor is on a commercial vessel that holds more than 25 passengers. It also creates a 12 month period where citations will not be issued for violations. The bill takes effect upon enactment. This would also trigger the 12 month grace period.

H-8556 to H-8552 by Baudler: Strikes the portion of the amendment creating a grace period. This would allow citations to be issue immediately. **H-8556 to H-8552** was **WITHDRAWN**.

H-8564 to H-8552 by Baudler: This extends the personal flotation requirement to all individuals, regardless of age, who are alone on a vessel on state waters. **H-8564 to H-8552** **LOST**.

H-8565 to H-8552 by Horbach: Lowers the age requirement in the Senate amendment to all children under the age of 6 to wear personal floatation devices. This age restriction parallels the requirement for safety seats in cars. **H-8565 to H-8552** **LOST**.

H- 8561 to H-8552 by Baudler: Prohibits any open bottles or containers containing alcohol from being in a boat on a state waterway. **H-8561 to H-8552** **LOST**.

The House **CONCURRED** in Senate amendment **H-8552**.
